Summary –there was a large a rise in the number of people claiming benefits during the Covid-19 pandemic, this has now reduced. In May 2023, 2.6% of Rushmoor’s working age population were claiming out-of-work benefits principally for the reason of being unemployed.

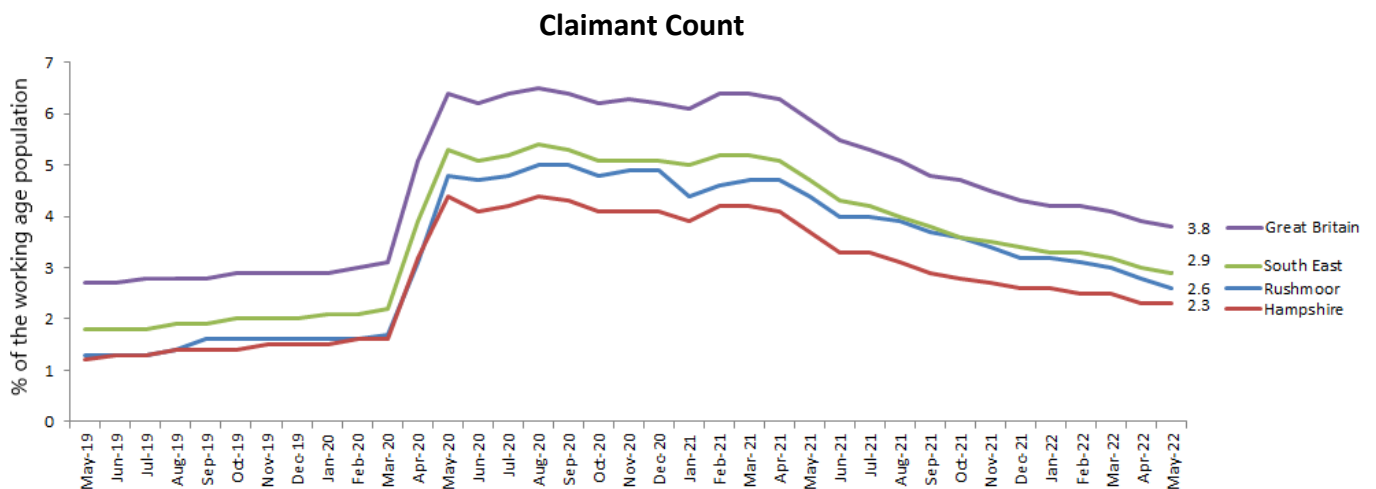
Claimant Count analysis

“The Claimant Count is the number of people claiming benefit principally for the reason of being unemployed. This is measured by combining the number of people claiming Jobseeker’s Allowance (JSA) and National Insurance credits with the number of people receiving Universal Credit principally for the reason of being unemployed”

In May 2023 there were 1,700 Rushmoor residents claiming out-of-work benefits principally for the reason of being unemployed, a decrease from 1,780 in December 2022. Overall, 2.6% of Rushmoor’s working age population (16-64) were claiming benefits for the principally reason of being unemployed. This was a lower percentage than Great Britain (3.7%) and the South East (2.8%) but a higher percentage than Hampshire (2.2%).

The following chart sets out the claimants as a percentage of the working age population. In March 2020 before the Covid-19 lockdown 1,030 residents claiming out-of-work benefits principally for the reason of being unemployed (1.7% of the working age population).

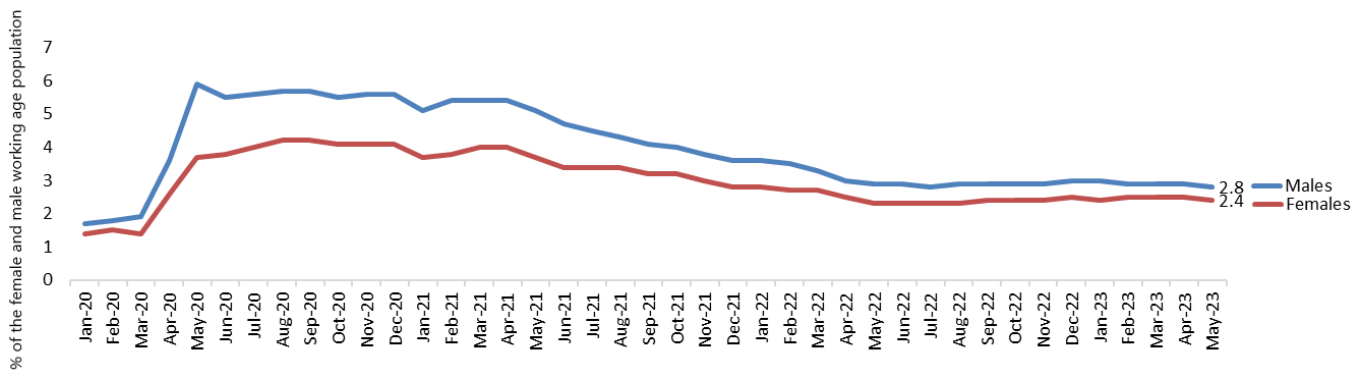

There are six wards that have a higher percentage of claimants than the Rushmoor average. The wards are Aldershot Park ward (3.9%), Wellington ward (3.6%), Manor Park ward (3.5%), North Town ward (3.5%), Cherrywood ward (3.2%) and Rowhill ward (3.1%) and All the wards in Aldershot have a higher rate than the Rushmoor average

Claimant Count by female and males

The following chart shows the percentage of males and females claiming out-of-work benefits principally for the reason of being unemployed. Of the 1,700 residents claiming 935 were male (2.8% of the male working age population) and 765 were female (2.4% of the female working age population).

Claimant Count by age

The following table shows the age of residents claiming out-of-work benefits principally for the reason of being unemployed in Rushmoor. In May 2023, 3.8% of 18-24 year olds were claiming. This is a higher percentage than Hampshire (3.4%) and the South East (3.7%) but a lower percentage than Great Britain as a whole (4.8%).

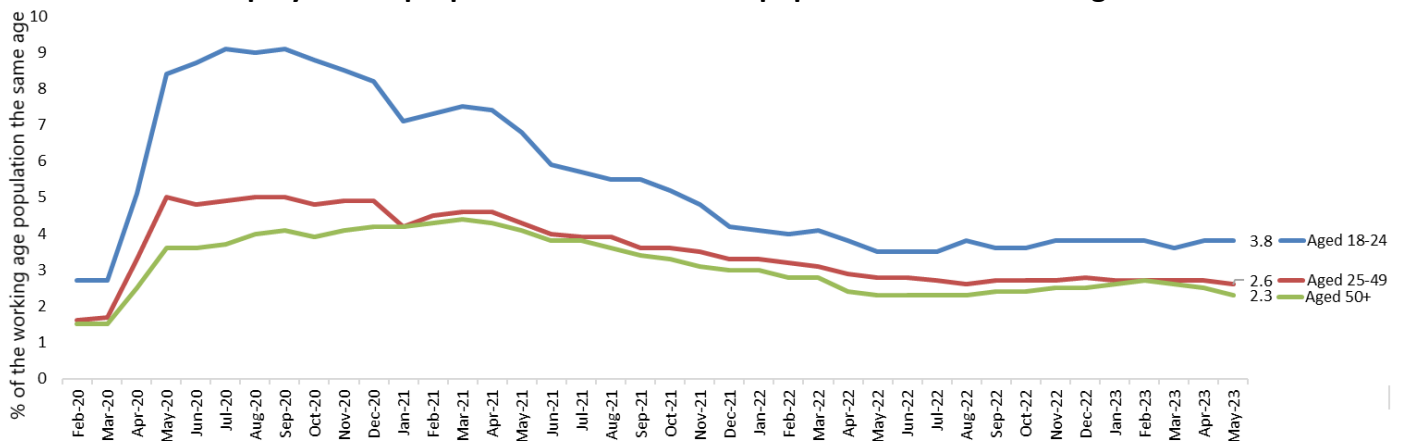

Percentage of residents claiming out-of-work benefits principally for the reason of being unemployed as a proportion of the resident population of the same age



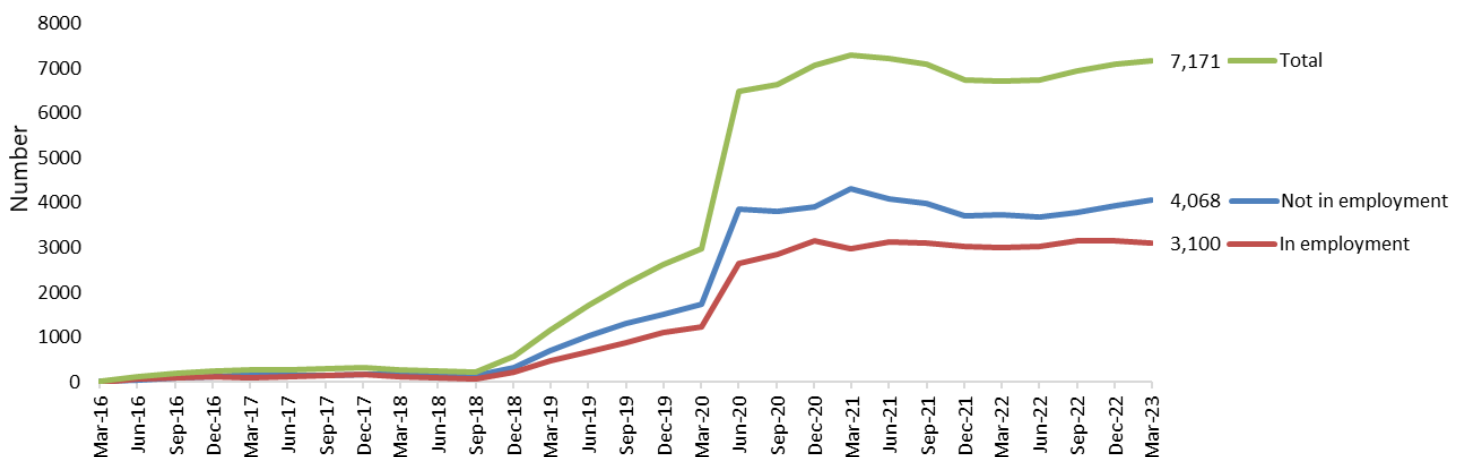

Universal Credit

Universal Credit is a benefit for people on a low income or out of work, who are below pension age. It began being rolled out in Rushmoor in February 2016 and will replace most means-tested benefits and tax credits, and will include payments for children and housing costs.

The following shows the number of people on Universal Credit in Rushmoor at the end of each financial quarter since the introduction of Universal Credit. There has been a sharp rise in people on Universal Credit between March 2020 and June 2020.

People on Universal Credit

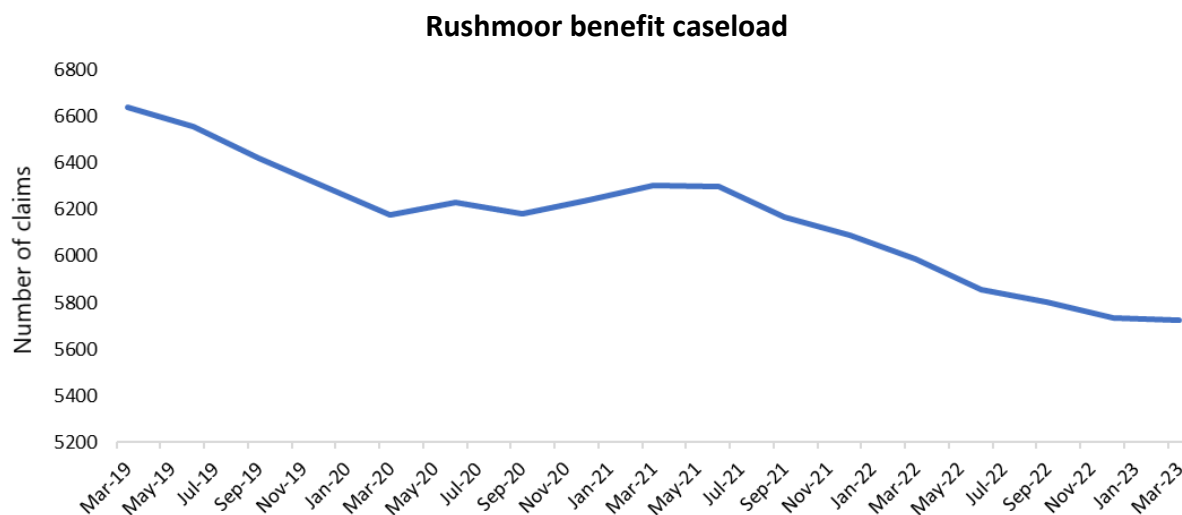

Housing and Council Tax Benefit take up

Rushmoor Borough Council is responsible for Council Tax Support (CTS) and local Housing Allowance (this is now covered by Universal Credit for those of working age). The benefit case load was 5,726 in March 2023.

The following table shows the number of claims has been declining over the past four years.



Model based unemployment

Not everyone who is unemployed is entitled to claim out of work benefits, the Office for National Statistics (ONS) Annual Population Survey estimates the percentage of the working age population who are unemployed. It should be noted that this is model based and the ONS Annual Population Survey base the data on a small sample of people in the area.

This data estimates that there are 1,800 people unemployed in Rushmoor (3.5% of the economically active population).

The following table shows the unemployment rate in Rushmoor, Hampshire, the South East and Great Britain. Rushmoor has a lower rate than Great Britain but a higher rate than Hampshire and the South East.

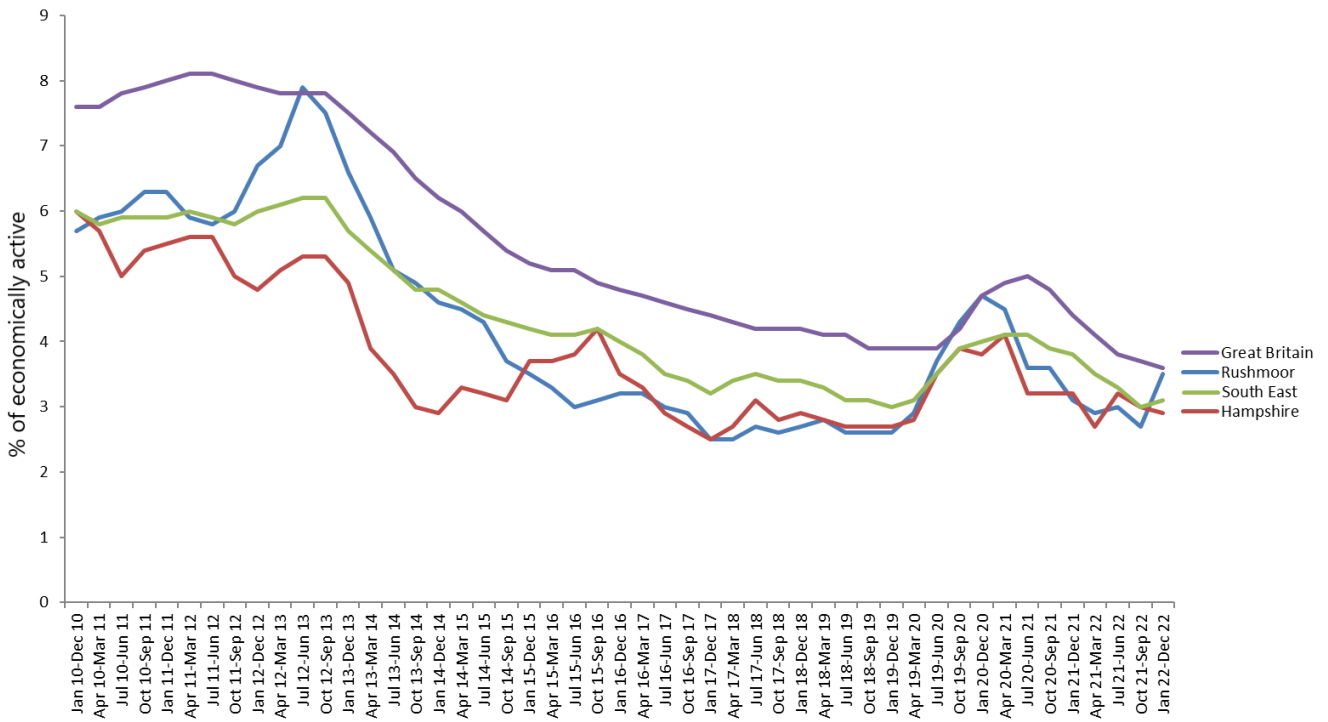
